


The **Town Hall**, situated in Martiri della Libertà Square was built in the thirties and follows a rationalist style. The architect Piero Borradori designed it to give a prestigious building to the new institution, born from the union of Villa San Fiorano and La Santa, suburb of Monza, by royal decree in 1929. The area in front of the square has hugely changed and this is clear looking at the picture (reproducing a postcard of those ages) observable on the wall facing the square. Following Garibaldi Road and turning in Mazzini Street you can see the copy of another postcard portraying how this corner was at the beginning of the 1900s. Proceeding along this way you will find many yards whose names are strange but evocative because they refer to the family names of those who once lived there or to their jobs. Moreover, there's a little **church** erected in XVI century called "Cappelletta dei Morti" (literally, "Chapel of the dead") originally built close to the leper hospital (the so called "Court di mort" in the local parlance) as a remembrance of the plague which affected Milan those years (1576-1577). The chapel withstood several renovations, the last one in 2002. The **postcard** visible nearby Daelli Square shows how this glimpse of Villasanta looked like in the twenties. This square is now a junction for the bike lane linking the Valle del Lambro Park with the local Cavallera Park and is also where this route crosses the red and the light blue ones. Taking the bike lane from "Mulini **Asciutti**", you will meet the Monza Park Entrance named "del Dosso", then the "Area Feste" (a green area for local events) along the Lambretto irrigation ditch. Eventually, after Sauro Road, you will arrive in Confalonieri Road where, turning right, you can see some frescos by Guido Adelio Galimberti depicting historical glimpses of the town; after that, you will reach Villa Camperio and its **beautiful gardens**. Built in the XVII century, nowadays is property of the municipality. Here stands the "Aldo Moro" Public Library where the **Camperio Archive Group** is preserved, too: it consists in a series of historical photos, books and documents. The picture on the panel observable beside the entrance shows how this corner of the town was in the **twenties**.
